Why is the Child Advocacy Program so important?

When children experience abuse their needs are multi-faceted; child advocacy centers such as CAP are uniquely positioned to address such needs. CAP brings together a team of community partners known as the Multidisciplinary Team (MDT). CAP provides a safe, child-friendly environment where law enforcement, child protective services, prosecution, victim advocacy, medical and mental health professionals share information and develop effective, coordinated strategies that are sensitive to the needs of each case and each child. Together, we help families work out their problems and find new hope.

CAP offers prevention workshops to strengthen an adult's capacity to protect and provide for children through Stewards of Children and Less Is More curriculums. Contact CAP for the dates and times of upcoming workshops.

Fredonia Grand Opening

CAP celebrated the opening of our Northern Chautauaua County location at 40 East Main Street, Fredonia, on June 12, 2015. Local, state and national dignitaries were on hand to celebrate with us. Funding for the new site was made possible through a grant from the New York State Office of Child and Family Services and the proceeds from the Step Up for Kids 5K Run/ Walk. CAP also received funding from the Northern Chautauqua Community Foundation to update video-recording equipment used in the forensic interview process.

2015 Champion of Children

Each year our Champion of Children Award honors those who have gone above and beyond to protect children and serve as an inspiration to others. Our 2015 honoree is the Lutheran Foster Grandparent Program. Together these "grandmas and grandpas" contribute 62,000 hours of volunteer service working with over 200 children annually.

Prevention Initiatives

CAP is committed to creating safe communities for children. CAP's prevention initiatives include "Stewards of Children (SOC)" and "Less Is More" trainings. In 2014, over 500 adults attended one of these trainings...join us!

SOC is a prevention training program created by Darkness to Light (d2l.org) that teaches adults how to prevent, recognize and react responsibly to child sexual abuse. The 2.5 hour training is an evidence based program recommended for all adults.

- In April 2015 CAP celebrated the 100th Stewards of Children training in Chautauqua County.
- Nearly 1600 adults are trained as Stewards of Children!

In 2014 CAP and the Chautaugua County Multidisciplinary Team began offering Less Is More trainings to administrators of schools and youth serving agencies. Less is More provides mandated reporters with the skills, knowledge and tools to respond appropriately to disclosures or discoveries of child abuse. So far, nearly 80 administrators have completed Less Is More training.



National studies indicate that a community with a child advocacy center spends about one-third less for the evaluation, investigation and treatment of abused children than a community without a child advocacy center – a savings of about \$1,000 per child.
